Landholders helping to restore Sandhill Pine Woodlands

In 2023 we joined forces with landholders in an ambitious project to protect and restore 134 hectares of the threatened Sandhill Pine Woodland community.

The Sandhill Pines Restoration Project is aiming to restore some of the community to a condition that offers habitat for birds and mammals, shade and forage for livestock, while also offering protection for important Aboriginal cultural sites.

Through the project, 80 kg of native seed was collected and direct seeded in the sandhills, which will restore 150 hectares of the ecologically endangered Sandhill Pine community.

Monitoring points have been established at the project sites and will be monitored annually.

This project is possible thanks to the involvement of landholders and Down the Track, a youth organisation from Lake Cargelligo. This project has been assisted by the NSW Government through its Environmental Trust.
