NORTH COAST ANNUAL ACHIEVEMENTS 2021



It is difficult to look back on 2021 without a sense of deja'vu. At the time of writing, we are once again dealing with a flooding emergency, and it is heartbreaking to see the sheer extent and damage these floodwaters have caused, particularly after many landholders were still recovering from the 2021 floods and 2019/20 bushfires. While it may be difficult to be optimistic now, facing similar circumstances last year, we were still able to work through the flood and COVID-19 disruptions to achieve some incredible outcomes across the North Coast. These included supporting landholders to improve agricultural production, increasing the area of land covered through our pest animal control programs, rehabilitating rivers, estuaries and native vegetation and finding innovative ways to connect with landholders through varying COVID-19 restrictions. 

OUR ACHIEVEMENTS IN ACTION

The North Coast is home to some of the best koala habitat in NSW. However, growing urbanisation, habitat loss has resulted in fragmented patches of poor-quality habitat. Unfortunately, other threats, such as drought, fires and pest animal attacks are further impacting koala populations. To help, we are working with landholders, NSW Government agencies, local councils, Landcare groups and Aboriginal groups to protect and improve habitat in four Areas of Regional Koala Significance between Port Macquarie and Coffs Harbour.

Through the program we help landholders create 'habitat refuges' by funding on-ground works, including pest animal and weed control, fire management planning and improved awareness about koala conservation. By the end of 2021, we had 15 landholders actively participating in the program and are working to have more taking part moving forward. By encouraging private land conservation in these significant areas, we can help ensure koala populations can persist for future generations.
