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Background

The NSW Koala Strategy identifies a set of actions to be implemented over the next three years with the aim of stabilising and increasing koala numbers across the state. One of the pillars under these actions is koala habitat conservation and protecting koala habitat on public land. This Management Plan is one of the outcomes identified in the Northern Tablelands Local Land Services (LLS) Cool Country Koala Project 2021-22.

Northern Tablelands LLS is responsible for the management of Humpy Bridge Travelling Stock Reserve (TSR). In the past the reserve has been available for lease under a grazing permit process. Permit conditions are reviewed and renewed with terms negotiated depending on vegetation condition, ground cover, water availability, stock type and numbers.

Site Description

Humpy Bridge Travelling Stock Reserve (TSR) is located 14 Kilometres west of Armidale on the Boorolong Road. It is bordered on three sides by privately owned grazing properties. The reserve is 16 hectares and contains vulnerable species and a Critically Endangered Ecological Community (see Table 1). It is located within an area of regional koala significance and has been identified as having key koala populations with potential for long-term viability.

Aims and Outcomes

Cool Country Koala Project 2021-22 short term project outcomes:

- By June 2022, the condition of 35ha of known or potential koala habitat in Travelling Stock Reserves within or in close proximity to Areas of Regional Koala Significance will be improved through supported natural regeneration and grazing management regimes.

Primary Regional Land Partnerships outcome:

- Outcome 2: By 2023, the trajectory of species targeted under the Threatened Species Strategy, and other EPBC Act priority species, is stabilised or improved.

Secondary Regional Land Partnerships outcomes:

- Outcome 4: By 2023, the implementation of priority actions is leading to an improvement in the condition of EPBC Act listed Threatened Ecological Communities.
- Outcome 5: By 2023, there will be increased awareness and adoption of land management practices that improve and protect the condition of soil, biodiversity and vegetation.

Reserve Use

Humpy Bridge TSR will predominately be managed for the conservation of koalas, other threatened species and the critically endangered yellow box grassy woodland.

Grazing of cattle will generally be restricted but may be used to reduce fire hazard and manage biomass if necessary. Up to 20 head of cattle for up to 3 weeks (21 days) of grazing may be permitted per year except during germination (spring) and flowering (mid-summer to late-summer). Grazing of sheep will not be permitted.

Management Actions
