### Fact Sheet 5 – Safety responsibilities and legislation

#### Safety responsibilities

Installing small-scale erosion control structures and undertaking other post-fire activities brings with them hazards and risks that are the responsibility of the land manager to identify and address or mitigate.

Examples of hazards include steep or uneven ground, working in or near water, operating farm machinery, risk of falling trees and manual handling.

Local Land Services may be able to provide example Safe Work Method Statements and other advice to support landholder safe work practices.

#### Legislation

Rules and regulations that may apply include, but are not limited to:

- authorization for clearing native vegetation (see *Factsheet 3 Managing native vegetation link*)
- training in pesticide and herbicide use
- controlled activity approval for working in and near a waterway.

Dial Before You Dig assessments should be made before any excavation to identify the approximate location of infrastructure assets to be avoided.
