

Threatened Flora Species of the Central West



Yass Daisy *Ammobium craspedioides*

The Yass Daisy is a perennial herb with a yellow flowering rosette. It has a single flower heads that can grow on stems up to 60 cm tall. They flower during October to November, with the rosettes dying off after fruiting. After the plants fruit they shrivel up and survive below-ground, resprouting again in Autumn

Within the Central West region, this vulnerable plant can be found forest communities and box gum woodlands, including known areas such as the Goobang National Park, Wellington, Stuart town and east to Dunedoo.

They are found in areas with low disturbance including Travelling Stock Routes, Crown reserves, cemeteries and roadside reserves.

Threats to the Yass Daisy

- Overgrazing from stock and feral animals
- Clearing for agriculture or development
- Competition from weeds and other invasive plants
