Feral fighter group baiting program

Since its inception in 2014, our Feral Fighters program has been delivering coordinated group pest animal control programs with landholders across land tenures. In 2022 the program helped landholders across the South East to target and control pest species across the region, facing increasing pest numbers on the back of strong seasonal conditions.

The Feral Fighters program within the South East region is a community-based initiative with 100 groups led by local landholders to undertake coordinated and effective landscape-scale pest control programs. The program helps landholders to meet their 'biosecurity duty' and educates the broader community on the impacts of pest animals.

Participants of the program receive subsidised training, baits and access to current technical advice.

Meeting regularly throughout the year, the group bait drops are an opportunity for landholders to network and connect. Some groups have included morning tea and discussion to increase social interaction.

Nearly 9 years on, the program continues to grow and spread to include more pest animal species, all working together to reduce the impact that pest animals have on production, the environment and the community with customers reporting outcomes such as improved lambing percentages and increased native fauna.
